Homily for the Fourth Sunday of Lent, 2025

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

Today, we celebrate the Fourth Sunday of Lent, also known as Laetare Sunday. The word "Laetare" means "rejoice," and this Sunday is a moment of joy and hope in the midst of the penitential season of Lent. It is a time to recognize the joy of reconciliation and the hope that comes from returning to God's embrace. We are called to trust in His love, to extend that love to others, and to live with hearts filled with gratitude for the gift of His grace.

As we reflect on today's Gospel, let us remember that Lent is not simply a time of sacrifice and penitence. It is also a season of joy, a journey toward the light of Christ and the celebration of His resurrection. May we take comfort in the knowledge that God's mercy is abundant and His love is unending.

Let us go forth with hearts renewed, rejoicing in the grace of God and sharing that joy with others. Amen!
